November is Alzheimer 's Awareness Month

- **Alzheimer's is a type of dementia that causes problems with memory, thinking and behavior.** Symptoms usually develop slowly and get worse over time, becoming severe enough to interfere with daily tasks.
- **Alzheimer's disease accounts for 60 to 80 percent of dementia cases.**
- **Alzheimer's worsens over time.** Alzheimer's is a progressive disease, where dementia symptoms gradually worsen over a number of years. In its early stages, memory loss is mild, but with late-stage Alzheimer's, individuals lose the ability to carry on a conversation and respond to their environment.
- **Alzheimer's has no current cure, but treatments for symptoms are available and research continues.** Although current Alzheimer's treatments cannot stop Alzheimer's from progressing, they can temporarily slow the worsening of dementia symptoms and improve quality of life for those with Alzheimer's and their caregivers. Today, there is a worldwide effort under way to find better ways to treat the disease, delay its onset, and prevent it from developing.

Self Determination Conference

The Self Determination Conference this year was held at the Kalahari resort in Wisconsin Dells. Four of our students from the Nicolet class were honored to receive scholarships to attend the conference and presented in two sessions. The theme of this year's conference was "Mission Impossible: Discovering the Potential in our Communities." The focus was exploring life in our communities. What does it mean to belong? How do you get involved? What can we contribute to our communities?

The conference was uniquely designed to bring the experiences of self advocates together with the assistance of professionals, family members, and support staff. The conference offered creative tools to help individuals with disabilities get the support that they need in order to have the life that they want. Attendees included adults and transition-aged youth with disabilities and their family members, service providers, educators, IRIS Staff, MCO staff, ADRC staff and county staff.

Conference highlights featured powerful keynote presentations from self-advocate Alisha Cloutier, International Consultant Darcy Elks, and Aaron Bishop Commissioner of Administration on Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities.
